
INDUS DEVELOPMENT FOUNDATION









IHHN'S FOOTPRINT

Recep Tayyip Erdogan Hospital (RTEH), Muzaffargarh

RTEH in Muzaffargarh initiated several programs including those for lung health and hepatitis, and is offering new services including neurology (with a functional neuro-physiology lab), infectious diseases, and pediatric urology. Lastly, RTEH has set up a rabies clinic and the See & Treat clinic.



Multan Institute of Kidney Diseases, Multan

This year, the MIKD campus in Multan has introduced urology clinics and carried out 23 kidney transplant services. An anastomotic urethroplasty for distraction urethral injury service has also been initiated in Multan for the first time.



District Headquarter Hospital, Badin

The District Headquarters Hospital in Badin is a 300-bed government facility that IHHN is managing under a public-private partnership. This year, the center of excellence program assessment on ICP has been initiated. Additionally, the departments of clinical service management and clinical affairs have been set up. Lastly, dermatology and oncology clinics have been introduced.





Indus Hospital – QF, NST & SMP Jubliee Town, Lahore

This year, the Jubilee Town campus in Lahore has initiated several outpatient clinics including hepatitis, family planning, lactation management, immunization, malnutrition hypertension, and diabetes.









Lahore Cluster

The Lahore Cluster features 5 government hospitals in Lahore that IHHN is managing under public-private partnership programs. These include the Tehsil Headquarters Hospitals in Manawan, Sabzarzar, Bedian Road, Raiwind, and Kahna Nau.

This year, the achievements of the Lahore Cluster include the initiation of hepatitis and tuberculosis clinics, and a surveillance program for disability (polio). Additionally, the center for stabilization and cholera outbreak management was upgraded, and a rabies prevention and dog bite treatment center was established.

FLOOD RELIEF EFFORTS

The monsoon season of 2022 brought with it the worst flooding Pakistan had seen in a decade. Along with the loss of property, livelihood, and lives, the floods brought with them a healthcare crisis of epic proportions. Indus Hospital & Health Network sprung into immediate action and entered the field with its flood relief medical team to provide urgent healthcare services to areas hit worst by the flooding.

IHHN set up Emergency Medical Relief Camps across Pakistan to provide emergency medical aid to the flood affectees and to combat the health issues that arose after the floods.








In addition to screening and treating patients for various diseases and infections, IHHN also provides mental health counseling at its medical relief camps, to help flood victims cope with the trauma of their losses. Medical Camps were also set up to deal with Maternal and Neonatal issues, where pregnant women have been able to access quality healthcare to deliver their babies and receive postpartum care.

Pakistan is very slowly rebuilding from the impact of the catastrophe, however, the crisis is not over. To ensure there is no vacuum left by the loss of healthcare facilities, IHHN plans to extend its efforts towards long-term dispensation of healthcare services in areas that are recuperating from the destruction of the floods. It intends to do so by keeping its current services in the affected areas active. IHHN plans to keep providing healthcare services in different areas till the establishment of the Basic Health Units lost in the floods.









A LIFE SWEPT AWAY

"Everything I had to live for was swept away in one night. My grief knows no bounds,"

Sakina Bibi, a resident of a small village in Sindh, Pakistan, wept as she tried to gather what was left of her belongings.

She had been sleeping with her newborn child when the sound of loudspeakers from the nearby mosque woke her up. The mosque was warning people to evacuate since floodwaters had ravaged the adjacent village and were now speeding toward them.

Sakina and her husband panicked. How could they collect everything, gather the family, and leave immediately? The family included her own two children – one toddler and a newborn baby, and her husband's brother and his family of six members.

While they gathered whatever belongings they could in a frenzy, a massive surge of water hit their house, sweeping away Sakina's newborn baby. In the blink of an eye, their livestock, belongings, and baby were carried away in a powerful wave.

Wading through the water, they were able to reach and station themselves on the roof of a local mosque. "I lost my baby. We lost everything, our house, our livestock. I had no food to feed my other child. I just couldn't cope", grieved Sakina. With no food, water, or shelter, Sakina's family and three other families were rescued after two days by the local government relief van. The four families were brought to a safe place where IHHN, with the support of Karachi Relief Trust, provided the families with food, shelter, hygiene kits, and medical care.

"It was here that I was able to share my sorrow with the medical team. They not only gave me medicine to treat my bruises and stomach infection but also counseled me to cope with my loss."

The Medical Relief Units by IHHN are focused on not only providing free medical care and medicines to men, women, and children but are also conducting mental health sessions and community awareness sessions amongst the displaced communities to help them cope with their loss and begin to take care of themselves.



PRIMARY CARE PROGRAM

IHHN's Primary Care Program (PCP) was launched in 2017 to provide vulnerable populations in Pakistan with access to high-quality and free of cost healthcare. The program integrates family medicine with public health interventions, customizing the services according to the needs of each specific community being serviced.

RESTORING LIVES THROUGH OUTREACH

Raheem Daad lives in Shadi Large, a small village in interior Sindh. He works as a daily wager to provide for his family and always takes pride in being resourceful and dependable. So, when his joints started to ache to an extent that he had to stop working, he fell into despair. "I couldn't afford to feed my children. I felt so helpless, bound to my bed by this pain that came out of nowhere," he told us grimly.

Luckily, one of their relatives convinced him to attend a community awareness session at one of IHHN's container-based community health centers that was located in the area. Raheem Daad learned of all the free of cost services offered at the clinic and at first felt disbelief. "We never had a hospital in this village. These things were what you would find when you went to cities. And even then they cost you an arm and a leg. But here it was free. I couldn't believe it."

After the session, Raheem Daad came up to our community health worker to tell him that he has severe pain in his joints that has kept him from being able to go to work. The doctor at the Shadi Large Container Clinic administered some blood tests, and it turned out that Raheem Daad had a severe deficiency of Vitamin D, which was causing his joints to ache.

The community health worker counseled him and altered his diet keeping in mind affordable options for him. Raheem Daad was further prescribed medications and dietary supplements to bring his Vitamin levels back to normal. Within 3 weeks Raheem Daad was feeling much better and went back to work to start earning for his family again. He continues to take his supplements and his wife makes sure he gets his daily intake of healthy meals.

Raheem Daad is extremely happy and very grateful for his treatment at the container clinic and gives his prayers to the donors of Indus Hospital & Health Network. "The hardest thing was to watch my children starve. I thought I had been cursed. But the doctors at this clinic really changed my life and I have no idea what I'd have done without them," a beaming Raheem Daad told us.



CHILDHOOD CANCER PROGRAM

Childhood Cancer disrupts the lives of more than 10,000 children in Pakistan, each year. Unfortunately, only 25 to 30 percent of children survive this heart-wrenching disease. The Pediatric Oncology Unit at IHHN in Karachi has been a game-changer and beacon of hope for millions in need. It is one of the largest of its kind in Pakistan. It is part of the St. Jude Global Alliance Partnership for education, training, and research initiatives. It provides its patients with comprehensive cancer care, with strong psychosocial support for the patients and their families.

BEYOND BORDERS: A FATHER'S TALE OF DETERMINATION

"I would work all day and in the end, I would still not have enough to afford the medicines my baby needed. Do you know how heartbreaking it is to know that you are not doing enough for your family?" Muhammad Ismail told us tearfully.

Muhammad Ismail's struggle is a testament to the fact that a father would be willing to do anything for his child. Hailing from Kandahar, Afghanistan, he traveled to Quetta in Pakistan with his three-year-old daughter, Bibi Sanam in his arms when she was diagnosed with bone cancer. The doctors in Afghanistan had told him that they could do nothing and that for him to save his daughter, he needed to try his luck in Pakistan.

In a state of utter despair, Ismail took a loan from his relatives and brought his daughter to Quetta, where doctors treated Bibi Sanam till her father's money ran out. Finally, a doctor suggested he go to Karachi and visit Indus Hospital & Health Network - which has one of the largest pediatric oncology units in Pakistan and provides cancer treatment free of cost!

At IHHN, Bibi Sanam was tested and admitted immediately. "Here they have provided my daughter with everything – a bed, clothes, medicines, treatment and they never took a single penny from me. I am telling you, there is no hospital like it (IHHN) in the whole of Pakistan," Muhammad Ismail told us.

This was ten months ago. Bibi Sanam recently completed her last round of chemotherapy and is waiting for clearance from the doctors to finally go home, back to her family. Muhammad Ismail is extremely grateful to IHHN for saving their child's life.

He now considers himself a lifelong supporter of IHHN and wants to give back in any way that he can, "Even if I have no money, nothing, I will come and donate blood to the hospital so that someone else can benefit the same way my daughter and I were helped."



MATERNAL & NEONATAL PROGRAM

Millions of young lives could be saved if mothers and babies had access to affordable and quality healthcare services. The health indicators of Pakistan reflect a poor state of mother and child health with limited affordable treatment options for both. IHHN's Sheikh Saeed Memorial Campus in Karachi and the Maternal, Neonatal, and Child Health Program under the Primary Care Program are playing an essential role in improving the maternal and neonatal health scenario in Pakistan by providing free of cost medical services to new mothers and neonates.

THE GIFT OF LIFE: **DELIVERING MIRACLES**

Mumtaz Shabbir was delighted when she found out she was pregnant with her third child. Having lived a life of hardship and poverty, her children were the ones who brought real joy to her life. Her first two pregnancies had gone smoothly and she had delivered all her children via cesarean sections. She assumed her third pregnancy would be the same.

In the 36th week of her pregnancy, she began to experience labor pains. She assumed it was time to deliver her child until she started to bleed heavily. Mumtaz panicked and her husband rushed her to Indus Hospital & Health Network's emergency room in Karachi.

At IHHN the doctors realized that Mumtaz had not one, but a host of rare and potentially fatal conditions affecting her pregnancy. She had Placenta Praevia, which meant her placenta was attached to the lower part of her uterus and was completely blocking her cervix. Her bladder was also densely adhered to her uterus.

The terrified mother pleaded with the doctor to prioritize her unborn child's life over her own. The doctors knew the surgery would be difficult but they assured Mumtaz and her family that both the mother's life and the baby's life were their priorities. She was immediately rushed to the operating theatre. An Emergency Obstetric Hysterectomy was performed on her. Her ruptured bladder and placenta percreta were successfully repaired.

The surgery was a success and Mumtaz awoke to meet her beautiful baby daughter. "All my terror washed away when I held her," a tired but beaming Mumtaz said. She was grateful to Indus Hospital & Health Network for saving her life and the life of her baby.






PHYSICAL REHABILITATION PROGRAM

Over 1 billion people across the world live with some form of disability, and this number is only expected to increase. In line with the World Health Organization's Sustainable Development Goals, IHHN envisions a world that is fully inclusive of all people, including those with physical disabilities. To this end, IHHN, in collaboration with the Red Cross and Chal Foundation, established a patient-centered and state-of-the-art Physical Rehabilitation Center (PRC) at its Korangi Campus in Karachi in 2015. Given the alarming prevalence of disability across the country and encouraged by the success of its operations in Karachi, IHHN soon established 3 additional PRCs in Lahore, Muzaffargarh, and Badin. The 4 PRCs are currently providing 4 categories of services, including Prosthetic and Orthotic Devices, Psychological Therapy, Physical Therapy, and Audiology and Speech Therapy.

THE ROAD TO RECOVERY


Muhammad Asif and his wife had high ambitions to give their children the best education possible. He worked in a factory and his wife worked at a beauty parlor to pay for their children's school fees.


One day, Muhammad Asif collapsed at work in the middle of the day from excruciating pain in his head. He was immediately rushed to a nearby hospital where the doctors informed him that he had just suffered an intense stroke. He was fortunate enough to have survived but was left with long-term Hemiparesis which caused him a severe weakness in the left side of his body.


He was unable to carry out basic tasks such as dressing himself or eating. His wife left her job to take care of him, reducing the income of their home to zero. Their children had to be pulled out of school when the family's entire savings went into Muhammad's rehabilitation treatments.

After the treatments proved futile, Muhammad was left devastated and thought all hope was lost. His wife convinced him to give it one last try and brought him to Indus Hospital & Health Network's Rehabilitation Center, where he was introduced to the Functional Electrical Simulation Bike. In this form of treatment, small electrical charges are applied to a muscle that has been paralyzed or weakened from damage to a person's spinal cord or brain. The electrical charges stimulate the person's muscles to make their usual movement. Muhammad's legs started to strengthen and his gait improved. Soon, he was able to walk again.

Today, Muhammad is back at work and his children have returned to school. He is endlessly thankful to Indus Hospital & Health Network. "The staff was so encouraging. They've given me my life back. My children can get an education thanks to them," Muhammad told us happily.









KARACHI EXPANSION

The health infrastructure of Pakistan is inadequate to deal with the high influx of patients coming in from across the country. In order to cater to these patients, Indus Hospital & Health Network is building a 1,350-bed multispecialty hospital in Korangi, Karachi. 
