Maternal and Neonatal Health in Pakistan

Maternal and Neonatal health in Pakistan faces significant challenges, with high rates of maternal and infant mortality reflecting deep-rooted issues in the healthcare system. Pakistan has one of the highest maternal mortality rates in South Asia, with equally concerning neonatal mortality rates. There is an urgent need for comprehensive healthcare interventions that address not only the medical but also the social determinants of health.

The barriers to maternal and neonatal health in Pakistan are multifaceted. Many women lack access to essential antenatal and postnatal care, which is critical for the health of both mother and child. Rural areas, in particular, suffer from a shortage of healthcare facilities and trained medical personnel, exacerbating the risk of complications during pregnancy and childbirth. Additionally, cultural norms and gender inequalities often limit women's access to healthcare services and education, further impeding efforts to improve health outcomes.




Indus Hospital & Health Network's (IHHN) Intervention





A Story of Resilience: Simran's Journey Through a Rare and Dangerous Pregnancy

The emotions that flood an individual when they discover they are about to become a parent are pure, delicate, and sweet. For Simran becoming a mother was a beautiful dream that she wished to experience at least once in her life, and the heroes of IHHN made it a reality despite all the difficulties.



Early in her pregnancy, Simran began experiencing severe abdominal pain and found out she had a Partial Molar Pregnancy - an abnormal pregnancy in which both a normal baby and abnormal, grape-like cysts develop inside the uterus. It is a very rare and dangerous condition, occurring in less than 1% of all pregnancies.

Simran's despair grew with each hospital visit, as each one claimed her baby had no hope for survival. Finally, by chance, Simran was referred to Sheikh Saeed Memorial Campus in Karachi - an IHHN owned maternity and neonatal hospital, where she was immediately taken in.

SSMC ventured into uncharted territory with Simran's case, marking the first time they handled such a high-stakes pregnancy. The likelihood of such a pregnancy resulting in a live baby is extremely low, with most cases threatening the mother's life. Fortunately, SSMC's staff comprises seasoned doctors in obstetrics and gynecology who undergo continuous training to stay abreast of global advancements in their field. To succeed in ensuring the health, safety, and survival of both Simran and her baby, the team of specialists at SSMC crafted a detailed plan for during and post pregnancy journey. They performed regular ultrasound assessments in addition to routine treatments, consulted with external experts, and studied similar cases.

To help her overcome her past trauma, Simran was given psychosocial counseling by SSMC's staff, who worked hard to prioritize her comfort, standing by her side, supporting, consoling, and mentally preparing her to cherish the happiness that motherhood brings. Towards the end of her pregnancy, Simran underwent a Cesarean section, and her baby girl was successfully born. Cradling her child, the smile on Simran's face spoke a thousand words of how grateful she was.

Considering that there is a shortage of resources across Pakistan, such a trained healthcare workforce is expensive and difficult to come across; however, IHHN manages and continues to do so guided by its strategic goals. Today, Simran and her daughter are healthy and happy - a testament to the resilience of the human spirit and the remarkable capabilities of medical science.

Maternal & Newborn Child Health Program

Enhancing Mother & Child Health through Primary Care

The nationwide launch of the MNCH Program aims to improve maternal, newborn, and child health outcomes, especially for underserved populations. This initiative strengthens IHHN's Family Medicine services and introduces Community Midwives for skilled deliveries at the grassroots level. IHHN uses mobile medical vans, labs, and container clinics to reach remote areas. The program also emphasizes community outreach and education on maternal and neonatal health, family planning, and healthcare.



















Nourish Mom Nutrition Program

To enhance maternal health, IHHN launched the NourishMom Nutrition Program, supporting new mothers during and after pregnancy. This initiative ensures mothers and babies receive both medical and nutritional support. Families receive monthly Ration Bags for 12 months: 6 months during pregnancy and 6 months postpartum to support breastfeeding and prevent infant malnutrition.

Addressing malnutrition among new mothers and babies in Pakistan is a complex challenge requiring sustained efforts. IHHN is committed to improving nutritional outcomes for women and children and invites you to join us in this crucial mission.





Midwife-Led Units

The Midwifery Program at IHHN operates Midwife-Led Units (MLUs) in Sindh, Punjab, and Azad Jammu & Kashmir, providing essential MNCH services. Staffed by community midwives, these units address the shortage of skilled healthcare professionals in remote regions, offering safe, high-quality, and free care.

Hybrid Telehealth Program

Greater emphasis was placed on the hybrid telehealth program after the 2022 floods destroyed the health infrastructure. The program swiftly provided essential healthcare services to vulnerable populations, especially women and infants.

The program's success demonstrated its sustainable and effective care model, leading to the establishment of additional telehealth clinics. These clinics now bridge healthcare gaps for peri-urban and rural communities in Punjab, Sindh, and Gilgit Baltistan, ensuring equitable access to high-quality healthcare. IHHN's Hybrid Telehealth Program empowers communities, improves health outcomes, and builds healthier futures for all.

Giving birth is one of the most profound and challenging experiences a woman can endure. For Mujaida Bibi, the mix of fear, anticipation, and hope was overwhelming. Three years ago, she brought her daughter into the world in Karachi, far away from her family, a loneliness that weighed heavily on her heart.

Determined not to face the same isolation, Mujaida decided to travel to Bhong for the birth of her son, to be near her parents and the comforting presence of her family. Despite her longing to be close to them, she was worried about the medical facilities in Bhong and how she would manage to safely deliver her baby.

Upon arriving in Bhong, Mujaida registered with the Indus Hospital Al-Ghazi Campus. From the moment she stepped into the facility, she was enveloped by a warmth and care that felt almost like a







miracle. The staff treated her as if she were one of their own, with nurses who were so attentive and kind that it felt as though her own sisters were by her side.

"The nurses were so attentive, I felt like they were my real sisters," Mujaida recalled, her eyes reflecting the gratitude she felt.

The support she received from both the hospital staff and her family created a cocoon of love and safety around her. For the first time in a long while, she felt truly at home.
